We have audited the financial statements of THE FRIENDS OF ROOKERY BAY INC. ("FORB" or "the Organization") for the year ended June 30, 2024, and have issued our report thereon dated September 30, 2024. Professional standards require that we provide you with information about our responsibilities under generally accepted auditing standards in the United States of America, as well as certain information related to the planned scope and timing of our audit. We have communicated such information in our letter to you dated January 12, 2023. Professional standards also require that we communicate to you the following information related to our audit.

Significant Audit Findings

Qualitative Aspects of Accounting Practices

Management is responsible for the selection and use of appropriate accounting policies. In accordance with the terms of our engagement letter, we will advise management about the appropriateness of accounting policies and their application. The significant accounting policies used by FORB, are described in Note 1 to the audited financial statements. No new accounting policies were adopted and the application of existing policies was not changed during the year ended June 30, 2024. We noted no transactions entered into by the FORB during the year for which there is a lack of authoritative guidance or consensus. All significant transactions have been recognized in the financial statements in the proper period.

Accounting estimates are an integral part of the financial statements prepared by management and are based on management's knowledge and experience about past and current events and assumptions about future events. Certain accounting estimates are particularly sensitive because of their significance to the financial statements and because of the possibility that future events affecting them may differ significantly from those expected. The most sensitive estimates affecting the financial statements were:

Management's estimate of uncollectible accounts, if any, is based on historical collection rates and an analysis of individual accounts. Management utilizes the straight-line method to depreciate its equipment assets and estimated useful lives are based on historical trends.

Qualitative Aspects of Accounting Practices (Continued)

The FORB relies on quoted market prices from active trading markets to estimate the fair market value of its investments, held with the Collier Community Foundation. We evaluated the key factors and assumptions used to develop these estimates in determining that they are reasonable in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

The financial statement disclosures are neutral, consistent, and clear.

Difficulties Encountered in Performing the Audit

We encountered no significant difficulties in dealing with management in performing and completing our audit. We did incur additional time again this year related to reconciling and posting several minor audit adjustments to agree the client-provided schedule of donor restricted activity (of which several versions of the schedule were received during the audit) to FORB's general ledger for the year which is required to properly balance the audited financial statements for fiscal year 2024. However, the modified chart of accounts in the general ledger for the restricted activity did help to improve the tracking and reporting process for the restricted activity compared to prior years and we suspect that this will continue to improve in future years. There was also some additional time in the area of fixed assets to prepare a schedule to roll-forward the activity for fiscal year 2024. We understand that the recording, tracking and monitoring for the FORB's has been set up in Quick Books for fiscal year 2025, which should improve this process.

Corrected and Uncorrected Misstatements

Professional standards require us to accumulate all known and likely misstatements identified during the audit, other than those that are trivial, and communicate them to the appropriate level of management. Management has corrected all such misstatements. In addition, none of the misstatements detected as a result of audit procedures and corrected by management were material, either individually or in the aggregate, to the financial statements taken as a whole.

Disagreements with Management

For purposes of this letter, a disagreement with management as a financial accounting, reporting, or auditing matter, whether or not resolved to our satisfaction, that could be significant to the financial statements or the auditor's report. We are pleased to report that no such disagreements arose during the course of our audit.

Management Representations

We have requested certain representations from management that are included in the management representation letter dated September 30, 2024.

Management Consultation with Other Independent Accountants

In some cases, management may decide to consult with other accountants about auditing and accounting matters, similar to obtaining a "second opinion" on certain situations.

Management Consultation with Other Independent Accountants (Continued)

If a consultation involves application of an accounting principle to the FORB's financial statements or a determination of the type of auditor's opinion that may be expressed on those statements, our professional standards require the consulting accountant to check with us to determine that the consultant has all the relevant facts. To our knowledge, there were no such consultations with other accountants.

Other Audit Findings or Issues

We generally discuss a variety of matters, including the application of accounting principles and auditing standards, with management each year prior to retention as the FORB's auditors. However, these discussions occurred in the normal course of our professional relationship and our responses were not a condition to our retention.

Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of FRIENDS OF ROOKERY BAY, INC. (a Florida nonprofit organization) ("the Organization) which comprise the statement of financial position as of June 30, 2024, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses and cash flows for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

In our opinion, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of FRIENDS OF ROOKERY BAY, INC. as of June 30, 2024, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards, issued by the Comptroller of the United States. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of FRIENDS OF ROOKERY BAY, INC. and to meet our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about FRIENDS OF ROOKERY BAY, INC.'s ability to continue as a going concern within one year after the date that the financial statements are available to be issued.

 reasonable period of time.

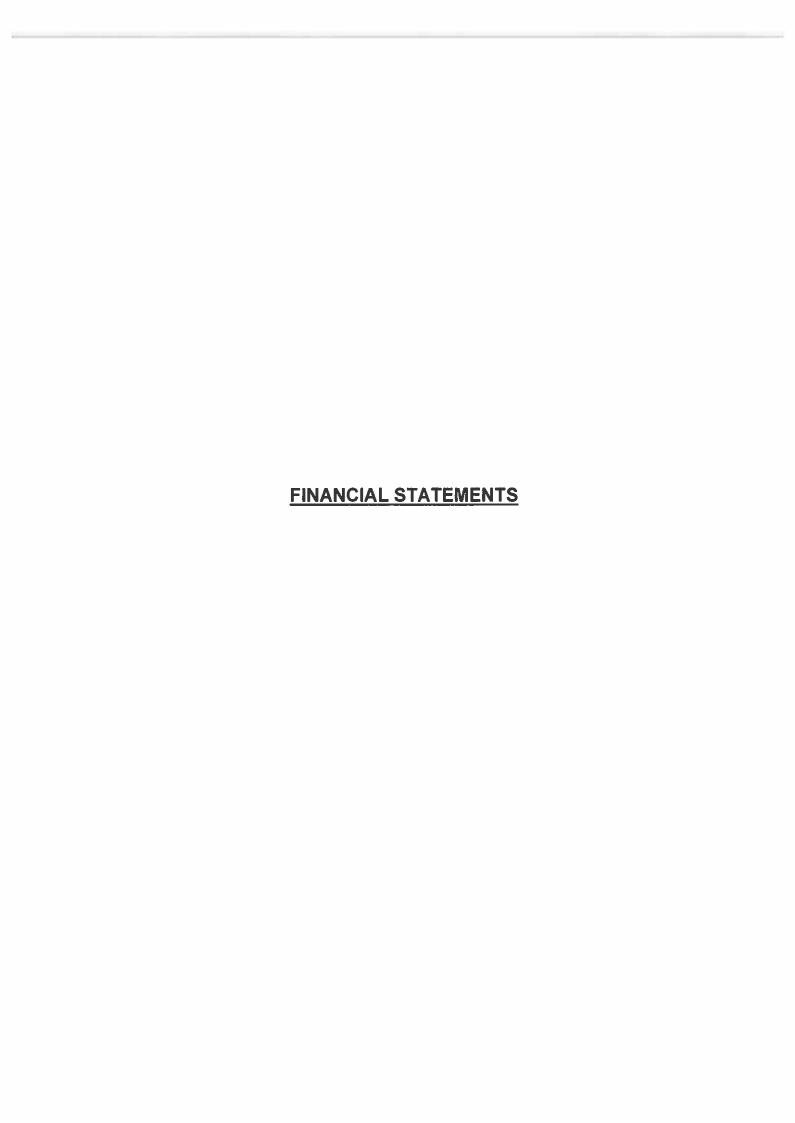

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTE 1 - NATURE OF ORGANIZATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Nature of Organization

FRIENDS OF ROOKERY BAY, INC. (the "Organization" or "FORB") is a nonprofit citizen support organization established to operate for the advancement of Rookery Bay National Estuarine Research Reserve (the Reserve) and to promote the purposes of the Reserve as well as to provide citizen support for resource protection, education, and research by the Reserve. The Organization was incorporated on December 8, 1987, under the laws of Florida as a not-for-profit Organization. The Organization's mission is to connect people to Southwest Florida's dynamic coastal environment in support of Rookery Bay National Estuarine Research Reserve. The primary source of revenue is individual and corporate donors, grants and program revenues in Collier County, Florida. The Organization also utilizes various subcontractor labor for significant support of its overall operations.

Method of Accounting

The accounts of the Organization are maintained, and the accompanying financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting. Accordingly, assets are recorded when the Organization obtains the rights of ownership or is entitled to claims for receipt and liabilities are recorded when the obligation is incurred.

Financial Statement Presentation

The Organization presents information regarding its financial position and activities according to two classifications of net assets described as follows:

Without Donor Restrictions

Represents the portion of expendable funds available for support of Organization operations and includes all investment income and appreciation not subject to donor restrictions. Designated amounts represent those resources which the Organization has set aside for a particular purpose. This designation may be removed at the Board's discretion.

With Donor Restrictions

Resources accumulated through donations or events held for specific operating or capital purposes. Such resources will become unrestricted when the requirements of the donor have been satisfied through expenditure for the specified purpose or program or through the passage of time. The Organization has net assets with donor restrictions at June 30, 2024, see Note 5.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

The Organization considers all bank and similar deposits and money market accounts with an original maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents. For purposes of reporting cash flows, the Organization considers all funds except those invested to be cash equivalents. The Organization's cash and cash equivalents are held at one federally insured financial institution located in Collier County, Florida. The Organization had aggregated bank account balances with this financial institution in excess of federally insured limits at June 30, 2024 totaling approximately \$249,000. The Organization has not experienced any losses on such accounts. The Board of Directors believes it is not exposed to any significant risk on cash and cash equivalents.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTE 1 - NATURE OF ORGANIZATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Investments

Investments are initially recorded at cost, if purchased or, if donated, at fair market value on the date received in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles ("GAAP"). The Organization carries investments at the fair value determined by the quoted market prices on the last day of the year. Investment income may be either with donor restrictions or without donor restrictions when earned, determined according to the restrictions imposed by the donor. Unrealized gains and losses are included in the change in net assets.

Inventories

Inventories are comprised of program related merchandise held for sale in the Organization's on-site gift shop, and is stated at the lower of cost or net realizable value.

Amounts Held In Escrow

During 2024, the Organization received a conditional contribution totaling \$35,000 which stipulated that the amount be maintained in a separate escrow account until the potential barriers to the entitlement for these funds are met.

Equipment

Equipment is recorded at cost when purchased or at fair market value at the time of contribution. Such donations are reported as without donor restrictions support unless the donor has restricted the donated asset to a specific purpose. Assets donated with explicit restrictions regarding their use and contributions of cash that must be used to acquire equipment are reported as restricted support. Absent donor stipulations regarding how long those donated assets must be maintained, Organization reports expirations of donor restrictions when the donated or acquired assets are placed in service. The Organization reclassifies donor restricted net assets to without donor restrictions at that time. Costs of major renewals and improvements that extend useful lives are capitalized. Expenditures for routine maintenance and repairs are charged to expense as incurred. Depreciation is primarily computed on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful lives of equipment ranging from three to five years. The Organization's policy is to capitalize expenditures for personal property and/or betterments equal to or greater than \$1,000.

Beneficial Interests in Assets Held by Others

Beneficial interests in assets held by others are recorded at fair value. Interest income, realized and unrealized gains (losses) based on market value change earned on such interests are recorded in the accompanying statement of activities.

Deferred Lifetime Memberships

FORB offers lifetime memberships allowing members to pay one sum for membership benefits covering the remainder of their lifetime. Under revenue recognition standard, ASU 2014-09, Revenue from Contracts with Customers (Topic 606), the revenue from these lifetime memberships is being recognized as the performance obligations are met by providing membership benefits over the estimated life expectancy of these members. As of June 30, 2024, \$25,000 was recorded as remaining deferred lifetime memberships on the statement of financial position to be recognized as revenues in future years.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTE 1 - NATURE OF ORGANIZATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Contributions

All contributions are considered to be available without donor restrictions use unless specifically restricted by the donor. Contributions are recognized when the donor makes a promise to give to the Organization that is in substance, unconditional. Conditional contributions are deferred and not recognized on the statement of activities until any barriers to entitlement are met.

When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, donor restricted net assets are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions and reported in the statement of activities as net assets released from satisfaction of purpose restriction. Donor restricted contributions whose restrictions are met in the same reporting periods are reported as without donor restrictions. Non-cash donations are recorded as contributions at their estimated fair market value.

The Organization reports donations of cash contributions received, which were not given for a specific purpose, as without donor restrictions in the statement of activities.

Contributed Nonfinancial Assets

Contributed nonfinancial assets, if any, represent the fair market values for goods and services provided for the Organization. Contributions of services are recognized only if services received (a) create or enhance non-financial assets or (b) require specialized skills, are provided by individuals possessing these skills, and would typically be purchased if not provided by donations. These contributions are included in the statement of activities under the caption labeled "contributed nonfinancial assets." For the year ended June 30, 2024, the Organization did not receive contributions of nonfinancial assets of significance, except for the fact that the Organization utilizes office space of the Reserve. No amount has been reflected in the accompanying financial statements for this contributed nonfinancial asset as it is not feasible to estimate such value.

Revenue and Revenue Recognition

Revenue is recognized when the performance obligation is met. Program service fees and special events income are recognized as the program services are provided or when the special events take place. As discussed above, any lifetime memberships are recognized as the performance obligations are met by providing membership benefits over the estimated life expectancy of these members. Retail sales are recognized at the point of sale. Payments under cost reimbursable contracts received in advance, if any, are deferred to the applicable period in which the related services are performed or when expenditures are incurred.

Tax Exempt Status

The Organization is exempt from federal and state income taxes pursuant to Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, and similar state Code. As such, only unrelated business income, as defined by Section 512(a)(1) of the Code is subject to federal income tax. Management is not aware of any activities that could jeopardize the Organization's tax-exempt status. The Organization has evaluated its tax positions and concluded that the Organization has taken no uncertain tax positions that require adjustments to the financial statements. The Organization's Forms 990, Return of Organization Exempt from Income Tax, for the years 2020, 2021, and 2022 are subject to examination by the IRS, generally for three years after they were filed.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTE 1 - NATURE OF ORGANIZATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Functional Allocation of Expenses

The costs of providing various programs and other activities have been summarized on the statement of functional expenses. The statement presents total expenses by function. Direct costs are charged directly to the programs or supporting services benefited. Costs related to both program and supporting services were allocated based on methods such as time and efforts as deemed reasonable for the mission of the Organization.

Evaluation of Subsequent Events

In preparing the audited financial statements, the Organization has evaluated events and transactions for potential recognition or disclosure through September 30, 2024, the date that the audited financial statements were available to be issued. No events requiring disclosure were identified.

Fair Value Measurement

FASB ASC 820-10 defines fair value, establishes a framework for measuring fair value under generally accepted accounting principles and enhances disclosures about fair value measurements. FASB ASC 820-10 defines fair value as the exchange price that would be received for an asset or paid to transfer a liability (an exit price) in the principal or most advantageous market for the asset or liability in an orderly transaction between market participants on the measurement date.

The Organization adheres to FASB ASC 820-10 and discloses fair value measurements for applicable assets and liabilities on a recurring basis, as required. This additional disclosure requires the presentation of the fair value of the assets or liabilities to be classified into three levels. The fair value hierarchy consists of three levels based on the inputs used to measure the fair value. These levels are defined as follows:

<u>Level 1</u>: Inputs that utilize quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the Organization has the ability to process.

<u>Level 2</u>: Inputs that include quoted prices for similar (but not exact) assets and liabilities in active markets and inputs that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly, for substantially the full term of the financial instrument. Fair values for these instruments are estimated using pricing models, quoted prices of securities with similar characteristics, or discounted cash flows.

<u>Level 3</u>: Inputs that are unobservable inputs for the asset or liability, typically based on an Organization's own assumptions, as there is little, if any, related market activity.

In instances where the determination of the fair value measurement is based on inputs from different levels of the fair value hierarchy, the level in the fair value hierarchy within which the entire fair value measurement falls is based on the lowest level of input that is significant to the fair value measurement in its entirety. In accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, investments for which fair value are measured at net asset value per share (or its equivalent) using the practical expedient should not be categorized in the fair value hierarchy. The Organization followed these accounting principles since the Pooled Funds of the Collier Community Foundation included investments measured at net asset value.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTE 2 - EQUIPMENT, NET

NOTE 3 - BENEFICIAL INTEREST IN ASSETS HELD BY OTHERS

On September 10, 2013, the Organization established a board designated Endowment Fund, known as the "Friends of Rookery Bay Fund" ("FORB Fund"), in the initial amount of \$5,000 with the Collier Community Foundation ("CCF") and CCF provided a matching investment of \$5,000 during 2013 to aggregate the FORB Fund to \$10,000. The FORB Fund was designated to be solely used for the support of Rookery Bay Research Reserve.

In 2019 the Organization established another Fund known as the "Norris Gaynor Scholarship Fund" ("Norris Gaynor Fund"), in the initial amount of \$150,000, as provided by a donor. The Norris Gaynor Fund, as restricted by the donor, is to be used for the Organization's overall mission of FORB and/or education and research internships. Additionally, during 2024, Organization established another Fund known as the "Sue Miller Memorial Scholarship Fund" ("Sue Miller Fund"), in the initial amount of \$160,000, as provided by a donor. The Sue Miller Fund, as restricted by the donor, is also to be used for the Organization's overall mission of FORB and/or education and research internships. As required by GAAP, net assets associated with these endowment funds are classified and reported based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions.

Invested amounts for each of these funds earn interest/dividends and may have realized as well as unrealized gains or (losses) based on market prices during the year. Earnings on donor restricted funds (Norris Gaynor Fund and the Sue Miller Fund) will be spent in accordance with the donor's wishes, and subject to a maximum 4% of the four-quarter average balance of the funds. Earnings on funds that are not donor restricted (FORB Fund) may be spent with Board approval, for natural disaster emergencies, or any other use that is within the mission and scope of duties of the Friends of Rookery Bay. The Norris Gaynor Fund requires a minimum balance of \$10,000 to be maintained. The Organization has an investment policy mirroring the CCF's investment return objectives.

The FORB Fund balances held with CCF as of June 30, 2024 totaled \$ 117,892 and the Norris Gaynor Fund and the Sue Miller Fund endowment balances at June 30, 2024, before amounts owed to operations as of June 30,2024, were \$199,152 and \$173,681, respectively. These Funds are reported at fair value, as provided by the CCF, and consist primarily of various funds as denoted below. Currently, the Organization's investment policy is to invest with the Collier Community Foundation.

NOTE 4 - CONDITIONAL CONTRIBUTION

During 2024, FORB received a conditional contribution totaling \$35,000 from a donor to potentially pursue a partnership with FORB to provide education to local schools in Southwest Florida about the need for coastal conservation. The agreement requires the Organization to perform a "needs assessment" with the local schools to determine various options for the use of the funds for the donor to consider. The donor has first rights to choose the use for these funds and the donor my request the return of these funds, if FORB does not have a project or program the donor would like to support.

NOTE 4 - CONDITIONAL CONTRIBUTION (Continued)

The agreement stipulates that the funds will be held in escrow while the needs assessment is being performed. As of June 30, 2024 and as of the date of this report, FORB is still in the process of conducting the needs assessment and thus the receipt of the conditional contribution was recorded as an amount in escrow and contingent escrow funds on the statement of financial position for 2024.

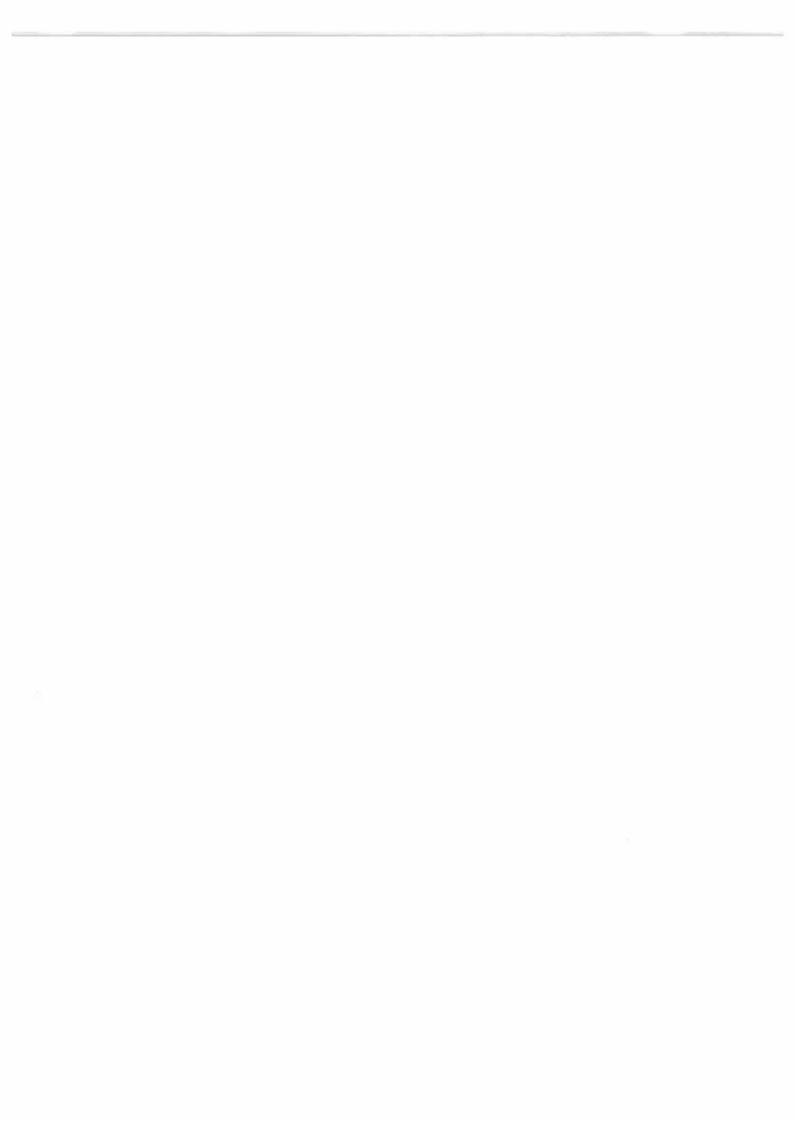

The FORB recognizes tax benefits only to the extent that the FORB believes it is "more likely than not" that its tax positions will be sustained upon IRS examination.
- 23. We have complied with all restrictions on resources (including donor restrictions) and all aspects of contractual agreements that would have a material effect on the financial statements in the event of noncompliance.
- 24. There are no estimates that may be subject to a material change in the near term that have not been properly disclosed in the financial statements. - 31. We understand that you prepared the trial balance for use during the audit and that your preparation of the trial balance was limited to formatting the information in FORB's general ledger into a working trial balance.
- 32. We acknowledge that amounts reported as of June 30, 2024 as "Board Designated" in the audited financial statements are amounts designated by the Board of Directors for specific intended purposes which could only be changed with approval of the Board.
- 33. We represent that for the year ended June 30, 2024, FORB did not receive any "in-kind" or noncash donations of significance.
- 34. We have complied with the approved and intended use of all donor restricted funds. Also, net assets with donor restrictions at June 30, 2024 are properly classified as denoted in the notes to the financial statements.
- 35. We represent that the contribution received during 2024 from the Kellogg Foundation totaling \$35,000 is a conditional contribution and thus, will not be recognized until all barriers to entitlement are met (anticipated to occur subsequent to June 30, 2024). We further represent that FORB has complied with the stipulations within the signed agreement related to this conditional contribution.
- 36. As part of your audit, you prepared the audited financial statements and related notes from the trial balance and the FORB's books and records. We have reviewed, approved and accepted responsibility for those audited financial statements and related notes and believe they are adequately supported by FORB books and records.
- 37. We have reviewed adjusting journal entries you have proposed and understand the nature of the changes and their impact on the audited financial statements. We are in agreement with the adjusting journal entries you have recommended, and they have been posted to the FORB's accounts.

- 38.
